BUTTERFLY REPORT

The exceptionally warm and dry summer and autumn provided almost ideal conditions for butterflies with the result that large numbers were seen throughout the season.

Reports commenced with a Comma on No.3 bed on 12th March and continued until the remarkably late sighting of Small Tortoiseshell on 27th November.

The more common butterflies were reported in what may be record numbers for Woolston, with peak totals of 821 Gatekeepers, 163 Meadow Browns, 105 Small Tortoiseshells and 89 Peacocks.

Interesting sightings included a single Small Heath on No.1 bed for the second successive year, and a Camberwell Beauty seen briefly on No.3 bed on the morning of 28th June.

On the negative side, there was only one report of Brimstone and none of Holly Blue.

Because more reports have been submitted this year, this report is more detailed than last year's initial survey. Many thanks to those who have reported their sightings either directly to me or via the logbook. To be of maximum value, however, it is helpful to have details of numbers seen and location as well as species.

In compiling this report I have made use of information in the Cheshire and Wirral Butterfly Report for 2003. My thanks go to Barry Shaw of Butterfly Conservation for his cooperation. I would recommend readers with an interest in butterflies and moths to join this organisation, which has an active local branch providing regular newsletters and an Annual Report to members as well as organising meetings and field trips.

The first record was on 22nd June when one was on the east bank of No.4 bed and four were seen in the Sandpit Pond area. Numbers increased to a maximum of 16 on 6th July of which 15 were on No.4 bed. Brimstone

Gonepteryx rhamni

The only record was of a single insect on the Ship Canal Track on 15th April.

THE Pieris brassicae Large White

Butterflies were noted from 7th May to 27th September, when five were reported on No.3 bed. The maximum recorded was 11 on No.2 bed on 15th September.

Pieris rapae

An early sighting was of one on No.2 bed on 30th March. Thereafter, small numbers were reported until the emergence of the second brood. Counts of 12 on 18th July and a minimum of 44 on 2nd August were the largest of the year. The final record was a single on 15th September.

Green-veined White

Pieris napi

Small numbers were reported from 16th April until 15th September with a maximum of five on 18th July. Because this butterfly is not always easily identified unless good views are obtained, under recording is likely.

Orange Tip

Anthocharis cardamines

A male on the Ship Canal Track on 14th April was the first of the year. By 16th April, ten were present on No.3 bed and the Canal Track. Thereafter, only small numbers were reported until the last sighting on 4th June, when three were seen on the west bank of No.2 bed. donard label syrist and lady in the negro side more at

Small Copper

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Always an uncommon species at Woolston, a total of eight sightings was an improvement on recent years. The first record was of a single on No.4 bed on 7th May, followed by one on Butchersfield Tip a week later. There were no further records until 20th August when one was found on brambles on No.3 bed. There followed a number of reports from Nos 3 and 4 beds, including 1st September when singles were seen on both beds, until the final sighting on 27th September.

Small numbers were reported from 14th May, when one was found on Butchersfield Tip and a second on the east bank of No.2 bed. Maximum numbers occurred at the end of May and the beginning of June. On 30th May a minimum of 19 was on Birdsfoot Trefoil on the north bank of No.3 bed with a further two on the Ship Canal Track. On 1st June, ten were seen on No.1 bed, with five at Latchford Locks, four on the Canal Track and two on waste ground on No.4 bed. Numbers then declined and only single figure counts were reported until the last sighting on 7th September.

Red Admiral

Vanessa atalanta

An early sighting on No.2 bed on 30th March and a second on 7th April were the first of the year. Such early reports add to speculation about whether such individuals have over wintered locally, but given the excellent weather conditions in March it is possible that these were early migrants from mainland Europe or North Africa. The

only other spring record was of one on No.3 bed on 14th May. Six were reported across the Reserve on 25th June, with similar numbers noted on various dates through July and August. Typically, numbers peaked at the end of September when a total of 15 was reported on Nos 3 and 4 beds. The final record was of three on No.3 bed on 12th October, 1 200 mon services in the same of the same production of the same state of the same stat

Painted Lady

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An influx of this species was noted on 1st June when seven were on the banks of No.4 bed and one on No.2 bed. On 5th June a total of 15 was reported for the whole Reserve. Thereafter, numbers reduced with reports of one or two throughout the summer and four on 24th August. Records continued into autumn with singles present on 9th and 17th October.

Small Tortoiseshell Advantage and standard and Aglais urticae and algain Aglais urticae

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Butterflies were present in large numbers throughout the season with the first record from No.3 bed on 14th March and eight on Nos 2 and 3 beds by 26th March. Few were noted during April and May but by 20th June 16 were counted in the centre of No.3 bed building to a Reserve total of 32 on 25th June. Lower numbers were reported during July and August but there was a dramatic increase towards the end of August. Over a hundred were seen on No.3 bed on 20th August and 105 were reported for the whole Reserve on 24th August. Only single figure counts were recorded thereafter until 17th September. Late records were one on 17th October and a probable sighting on 10th November. On 27th November, a mild sunny day, there were records of single butterflies on both Nos 3 and 4 beds, a remarkably late date.

Camberwell Beauty

Nymphalis antiopa

nexpensive that would select the nitrate or On the morning of 28th June a butterfly of this species was seen briefly on the south meadow area of No.3 bed by K.Foster. This may be the first Woolston record of this rare immigrant to Britain, although there is a possibility that the butterfly was an escape. If this was a genuine migrant it may have come from southern Europe where its normal flight period is from mid-June to July. Most British sightings occur in late summer and are thought to have come from Scandinavia where it breeds later in the

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Sightings began on 21st March when two were on No.3 bed. Small numbers were reported on various dates until 14th June with a maximum of three on 6th April. There were no further reports until 18th July when eleven were present. The beginning of August saw a major emergence with 35 on No.3 bed on the first and the remarkable total of 89 on Nos 3 and 4 beds the following day, including 25 feeding on Hemp Agrimony in a ditch to the west of No.4 bed. Very few were reported thereafter with five on No.3 bed on 17th August and the final record of a single on 9th September. It is interesting that this species fared so well at Woolston this year as in the rest of Cheshire it was scarcer than normal.

The first record following hibernation was of one on No.3 bed on 12th March. Singles were noted on other dates in March with a maximum of five on 22nd March. There were no other reports until newly emerged insects were noted from 20th June onwards, with large numbers building up. On 24th June nine were on No.3 bed and a Reserve record total of 17 was present the following day, including seven along the river to the north of No.2 bed. On 6th July, 13 were reported from No.3 bed. One or two butterflies were noted on various dates in July and August, with a late summer peak of nine on 5th September and six on 15th September. The last record was of one on the south bank of No.3 bed on 10th October.

Speckled Wood

Pararge aegeria

A single on 15th April was followed by six on the south bank of No.3 bed the next day. Insects were reported in single figure numbers until a major build-up in late summer when 35 were on the Reserve on 22nd August and 20 on No.3 bed two days later. Up to eight were recorded on several dates until 27th September and the final sighting was of a single on the south bank of No.3 bed on 10th October.

Gatekéeper

Pyronia tithonus

Butterflies were reported from 6th July when 42 were seen. A total of 821 was recorded for the whole Reserve on 18th July with further large counts on 29th July (400 on the west bank of No.4 bed) and 181 on No.4 bed on 2nd August. Very few were seen thereafter and the final sighting was of a single insect on 22nd August.

Maniola jurtina

The first record of a single butterfly on 20th June heralded a rapid build-up to 42 on 25th June rising to a maximum Reserve total of 163 on 18th July. On 2nd August 77 were present following which numbers declined to 15 on 22nd August. A single on 7th September was the last sighting of the year.

Small Heath

Coenonympha pamphilus

For the second successive year a single insect was found on No.1 bed. On 16th July, a hot sunny day, one was observed near the west pool. This follows last year's sighting of one, also on No.1 bed, on 12th July.
